Paris, France

Where?

There are 380 million square kilometres of water on Earth, yet only 2% of it is livable. These are our rivers, lakes, lagoons, estuaries, and the sheltered waters in our cities and ports. Take Paris, for example: once primarily a commercial port, it is now evolving into a vibrant urban waterfront, a shared living space for all its citizens.

Who?

In Paris, riverfront spaces are rare but **highly visible**. They are reserved for **exemplary community projects**, focused on health, art, solidarity, hospitality, sport, leisure, and culture.

While the Port of Paris remains a commercial hub essential to the city's development, growing diversity and innovation are transforming it into a shared space for all residents.

How?

In Paris, the river is no longer obstructed by polders or other constructions that encroach on natural space. Instead of pile-supported buildings vulnerable to floods and rising waters, the city now embraces floating architecture, designed for resilience, modularity, and flexibility.
